GEORGE AITKEN (NeoGeo)

In my practice I work primarily with neon glass producing one-off art pieces. Working with this medium for the last 30+ years I find producing individual pieces by hand very rewarding.

The vibrant colours of true neon can be mesmerising and changes with the contrasting ambient light through the course of the day/night due to experimentation in light refraction and reflection. The art of blowing glass is an ever evolving one. The practitioner is always learning new parameters and techniques.

JANE DONLIN

I contemplate the aesthetic function of the crafts, seeking to create work that connects with people and with the non-human landscape of nature, to the earth beneath my feet. The quality of the materials is central to my craft. I consistently use fibres that originate from nature [flax/cotton/hemp or wool/silk]. I used cotton and linen fibres for *Encounters*. It is a handwoven work that draws on the Theo Moorman inlay technique to create 9 visual images of my interactions with non human landscape.

JOAN PETERS

Drawing from Life's rich and varied palette, Joan Peters chooses to paint the quiet moments that whisper emotion and memories. Joan uses art to speak when words fail and is happy when her response to unrest becomes a creative celebration. The Dress is one such response giving us a glimpse at clothing being a marker of gender fluidity.

SARA DRAKE

Sara is a Fremantle-based mapmaker, artist and sculptor working in a unique illustrative style. She specializes in creating highly detailed and decorative mixed media maps. Her work ranges from large-scale globes and world maps, to smaller scale maps of individual towns, cities and countries.

Sara combines a wide range of art techniques, including sculpture, painting, cartography and modelmaking and uses a plethora of materials, both found, new and recycled. She trained in London as a furniture designer but now works exclusively as a mapmaker. Most works are personalised and made to private commission, but Sara also creates maps for corporate, hospitality and media clients around the world. Recently she has also started producing a range of high quality, limited edition prints of her maps, several of which are held in the Map collection of the State Library of WA.

ALISON BULLOCK

Wherever Alison has lived she has been drawn to spending time in the natural environment: the bush, a river, the sea, a garden. After a long career in education she is now pursuing an art practice utilising the foraged fibres found in these places near her home in Fremantle. A ceramics course completed in the 80's has also influenced the form of vessels in this collection – ceramic bowls with strong rims have morphed into small woven, coiled and stitched vessels with extra layers of fibre interlaced with recycled beads for rims. This is a collection of vessels that considers form, texture and colour and acknowledges the rich diversity of the natural world
